Preface

Immigration Partnership Winnipeg (IPW) has created this Directory of Funding Resources for ethnocultural communities. Part of IPW's major role is to engage stakeholders and facilitate the identification of newcomer needs and priorities.

The Directory is divided into two sections. Section One has a list of potential funders and Section

Two includes tips on how to find and make a successful funding application. Because ethno-cultural communities do the work they do in their communities over their daily jobs, this document would make it easier for them to look for funding for their communities' programs.

Section One - Details about funding for community programs

ENDOW MANITOBA FUND

The Manitoba government has established the Endowed Manitoba Fund in the province. This was in a bid to encourage philanthropic activities and the growth of Community Foundations. The Funds, which will be managed by Winnipeg Foundation, is expected to assist the growth of rural community foundations. These funds will benefits programs that include the following:

- · Capacity-building community foundation workshops
- Shared research and development projects
- Information technology enhancement programs
- Virtual communication platforms, such as website development that will enhance
- communication with the public and internally between community foundations; and •

A commitment to expand the network of rural community foundations.

Grant criteria:

- The recipient must be a qualified grantee:
 - o Registered charity, with a CRA number
 - o Municipal government; or
 - Non-profit group with a formalized partnership with a registered charity or municipal government.
- Grant funds must be devoted to a specific project, not be used for general operations. The project is within the boundaries of the community foundation's area (exceptions may apply).
- The project must benefit the residents of the community.
- The project must not be partisan or political in nature.

NOTE: These guidelines do not apply to Scholarships.

The disbursement of grant funds is controlled by the community foundation and may be dependent on project milestones, spending, reports, or any other criteria determined by the community foundation.

Potential Funding Sources for Ethno-cultural Community Groups in Manitoba

This program was necessitated for continuity of Manitoba Multiculturalism policy and its principles of pride, equality, and partnerships.

a) Multiculturalism Secretariat

This is a Manitoba-serving grant that supports program costs such as facility rentals, honorariums, supplies, equipment rentals for community-based organizations promoting cultural exchange in the province. It also supports for ethnocultural languages)

Criteria: Must be a Manitoba Ethnocultural Group or an organization partnering with an ECG.

- Must be not-for-profit
- Must be community-based
- Must be incorporated under provincial or federal law
- Must have membership that is open to the public
- Grant Amount: Usually between \$3500 to \$15 000
- Application Deadline: April 30th and Oct. 31st but must contact a month before

e) Community Incentive Grant Program



Community Incentive Grant Program is established to support non-for-profit community organizations "to undertake improvements or purchase capital assets that are available for public use or will enhance public use of a space or facility" (*https://www.winnipeg.ca/cms/recreation/cigp.stm*).

This fund is opened to not-for-profit organizations that promote health and wellness services in the community. This refers to "a corporation or an association that conducts business for the benefit of the public without shareholders and without a profit motive. Any profit that is made is used to further the goals or under- taking of the organization. Profits must not be used by the individuals involved for their own personal financial gain".

Section One - Details about funding for community programs

Criteria:

- 1. Organization is a non-profit community organization that contributes to the health and well being of the community.
- 2. The project is a capital improvement or the purchase of a capital asset that will be retained for more than one (1) year.
- 3. The project is available for public use or will enhance public use of the space or facility.
- 4. Project will be initiated and substantially completed within two (2) years of award. 5.

Total City of Winnipeg contribution is 50% or less of the total project costs.

f) United Way (Organizational Development Fund)

The Organizational Development Fund, offered through United Way, provides funds for capacity building in an organization, primarily through the development of plans and policies relating to strategic and business planning, human resources, governance and leadership, financial management, research, and strategic alliances and partnerships

Criteria:

- Must be a non-profit organization that is based in Winnipeg and working in the health and social ser- vices sector
- Does not fund capital purchases, staff training, space rental, workshop registrations, etc. Grant Amount: Maximum \$5000
- Application Deadline: April 1st 2021 and November 30th 2021

Government of Canada potential funding opportunities for communities

a) The Government of Canada funding for economic and social developments

These grants are for programs for jobs, training, Language, youth programs and social development projects.

b) Canadian Heritage: Funding for cultural, history and sports

The general list of funding includes any different types of funding that may be of interest to ECGs (such as funding related to Media, traveling exhibits, Music, the Court Challenges, Sports, and Youth-focussed programming)

The list for funding opportunities is very long. You may want to explore to see what would fit your funding needs. We will highlight only here few out of the list.

c) Supporting Black Canadian Communities Initiative:

The initiative aims to provide funding through a fair and transparent process, and otherwise support Black community organizations across Canada to increase their organizational capacity in the areas of:

1. Facilitating access to funding from a more diverse range of funding sources

- 2. Enhancing organizational governance to provide greater organizational stability and improved planning and oversight functions
- 3. Enhancing operational management effectiveness and efficiency

The deadline to apply for the funding is October 22, 2021

d) Inter-Action: Multiculturalism Funding Program Events (Federal Government)

This is a national program that provides funding to community-based events that promote inter cultural understanding; the primary intention is to create concrete opportunities for interaction among cultural, faith, or ethnic communities

Criteria

- Must be a Canadian not-for-profit organization, association, or unincorporated group of individuals
- The event must demonstrate involvement of more than one single cultural, religious, or ethnic community and establish opportunities for interaction among them,
- Must foster intercultural understanding and/or respect for core democratic values, Must be open and intended for the general public
- Grant Amount: up to 50 percent of the total cash expenses of the event (maximum \$25 000)
- No deadline. Check the website regularly. *https://www.canada.ca/en/canadian heritage/services/funding/community-multiculturalism-anti-racism/projects/forms.html*

e) Building Communities Through Arts and Heritage (BCAH): It was

created to help you celebrate your community – both its past and its present. This program increases opportunities for local artists, artisans, heritage performers or specialists to be involved in their community through festivals, events, and projects. It also allows local groups to commemorate

their local history and heritage. BCAH offers funding through three separate components:

Local Festivals: The Local Festivals component provides funding to local groups for

recurring festivals that present the work of local artists, artisans, and heritage performers. Read more about who can apply for funding through the Local Festivals component. Community Anniversaries:

• The Community Anniversaries component provides funding to local groups for non-recurring local events, with or without a minor capital project. Eligible events and capital projects are those that commemorate the 100th anniversary or greater (in increments of 25 years) of a significant local historical event or personality. Projects that commemorate the 75th



anniversary of locally significant events related to the Canadian participation in the Second World War are also eligible. Eligible capital projects such as community art projects, restoration of objects, community history books, statues and murals can be funded up to a maximum \$25,000. Read more about who can apply for funding through the Community Anniversaries component.

- Legacy Fund: The Legacy Fund component provides funding for community-initiated capital pro- jects that restore, renovate, or transform an existing building or exterior space (such as a statue, com- munity hall, monument, garden or work of art) intended for community use. Eligible capital projects are those that commemorate the 100th anniversary or greater (in increments of 25 years), of a significant local historical event or personality. Projects that commemorate the 75th anniversary of locally significant events related to the Canadian participation in the Second World War are also eligible. Read more about who can apply for funding through the Legacy Fund component.
- Celebrate Canada provides funding to community-based activities celebrating and promoting National Indigenous Peoples Day on June 21, Saint-Jean-Baptiste Day on June 24, Canadian Multiculturalism Day on June 27, and Canada Day on July 1. These celebrations enable Canadians to appreciate Canada's cultural, ethnic, linguistic, and geographic diversity. The expected results of Celebrate Canada's support of community-based activities
 - Commemorate Canada: this program provides funding to initiatives that commemorate and celebrate historical figures, places, events, and accomplishments of national significance.

Criteria:

- Must be of national interest and national or multi-regional in scope see Anniversaries of significance in 2017 for examples of commemorations that could be supported through funded initiatives.
- Must include a learning component to increase Canadians' knowledge of Canada's history. Must enhance the sense of pride and belonging to Canada.
- Must provide opportunities for Canadians to participate in commemorative activities and/or celebrations of national significance.

• Must engage at least one of the following target groups: youth, Aboriginal, Official Languages linguistic minority communities, or ethnocultural communities; and • Must have obtained financial or in-kind support from other sources (applicant and/or partners).

- Must be a program favours commemorations and celebrations marking 25th, 50th, 75th, 100th anniversaries and subsequent anniversaries in increments of 25 years.
- There is no deadline though it's recommended that applicants submit at least 6 months before the start of the project.

Various Funding for organizational capacity building and community supports

a) Maytree Foundation

It is a national charity that funds initiatives that address systemic causes of poverty and safeguard social and economic rights. It aims to develop leadership and skills capacity among civil society and to strengthen the connections among civic communities

Criteria:

- Must be a registered charity with an explicit mandate to reduce poverty and build strong civic com- munities
- Does not fund equipment purchases, building and renovation costs, conferences, and workshops, religious activities, programs/services that are part of the government's mandate, etc.
- Grant Amount: There is no set amount
- Application Deadline: No deadline It is found at https://maytree.com/grants/

b) Assiniboine Credit Union (Community Grants) for community support

It is a Manitoba-serving initiative that funds office equipment upgrades, professional development, public awareness, and strategic plans.

Criteria:

• Must be a non-profit organization, association, society, charity, or social enterprise working to

in- crease the social and economic participation of marginalized members of the community, to address environmental sustainability, or to develop community enterprises

- Does not fund an ongoing program, political party, competitive sports organization, or religious activity
- Grant Amount: \$500 to \$5000
- Application Deadline: May 1st and November 1st, dates likely to be the same It

c) Communities at Risk

Security Infrastructure Program (SIP): The purpose of the SIP is to support the implementation of projects to help communities with a demonstrated history of being victimized by hate-motivated crime through the enhancement of their security infrastructure. Public Safety Canada receives applications from December 1st to January 31st and from June 1st to July 31st of each year. d) Community Resilience Fund (CRF) Criteria

- Enhancing research capacity to support a CRV Centre of Excellence for policy development, programming, and engagement activities.
- Supporting evidence-based models and promising practices which address known risk and protective factors to prevent radicalization to violence.
- Building capacity to address radicalization to violence through expert knowledge, enhance cooperation and knowledge transfer to key stakeholders; and
- Empowering local communities to take steps to prevent all forms of radicalization to violence.

Grant Amount: Maximum \$5000

f) Assiniboine Credit Union (Community Sponsorships) This fund is geared towards community fundraisers (if an ACU member), arts and cultural events in Manitoba, community festivals, and celebrations

Criteria:



- Must be a non-profit, registered charity, or co-operative
- The event must not be a third-party fundraiser, religious activity, or sporting event •
- **Grant Amount:** \$500 to \$2500
- Application Deadline: No deadline, but should apply at least six weeks before the event

g) Per Capita Grant (offered through City Council)

The office of each City Councillor can assist residents in their area with applying for the Per Capita Grant; the grant is often used for organizing block parties and community functions

• There is no official criteria, but must be organizing something that will benefit the ward • **Grant Amount:** \$100 to \$500

• No deadline

h) Thomas Sill Foundation

It is a Manitoba-serving charity that funds capital, operating, or project related costs in the areas of arts and culture, heritage, community development, education, etc.

Criteria:

- Must be a registered charity
- Funds a diverse number of projects must consult with the organization to know if eligible or not
- Grant Amount: Ranging from \$500 to \$100 000
- No deadline: can take four months from date of application to receive a response

i) Catherine Donnelly Foundation

It is a national charity that have grants have for volunteer capacity building, advocacy, policy development, research.

Criteria:



• Must be a registered Canadian charity; preference given to organizations working with persons not served by traditional programs, when programs have the potential to be imitated in other communities, and when the organization can partner with other like-valued organizations

• Does not fund operating deficits, retroactive funding, fund raising campaigns, etc. • Grant Amount: Ranging from \$5000 to \$100 000

Criteria:

- projects include schoolyard greening and outdoor classrooms, citizen science projects, community classrooms, recycling/composting programs, in-class/indoor and outdoor environmental education programming, etc.
- Does not fund capital costs/infrastructure, playground equipment, venue/equipment rentals, projects occurring on private land, etc.
- Grant Amount: Usually between \$2000 and \$8000
- Winter submission deadline is January 15th and summer submission deadline is July 15th

I) SPARK

It is a Winnipeg-based service of the Canadian Community Economic Development Network that seeks to strengthen community groups working for social and economic change; SPARK passes on knowledge, re- sources, and expertise through referrals, workshops, and pro bono matches with skilled professionals

Past services have included legal advice, communication plans, marketing plans, mentoring, etc.

Criteria:

- Must be a community organization, non-profit, or worker co-op located in Winnipeg, be addressing a social issue using a community development approach, have the capacity to carry on the project after the matched professional has departed, and have limited or no ability to pay for the services required
- Grant Amount: N/A
- There is no deadline; contact the organization to discuss a proposal

Potential funding opportunities for youth programs

a) Urban/Hometown Green Team

It is a Manitoba-serving government program that provides summer employment opportunities (May 1st to August 31st) for youths aged 16 to 24 by matching them with a community organization; Green Team subsidizes the wages.

Youth matched to an organization have undertaken a variety of tasks, including coordinating/supervising activities for children, maintaining community vegetable gardens, community beautification, etc.

Criteria:

- Must be a non-profit organization in Winnipeg or rural Manitoba, provide a minimum 150 regular hours of employment, have Workers Compensation coverage for all approved employees, etc.
- Grant Amount: Organization will be reimbursed the Manitoba minimum wage and 4% vacation allowance for each approved program employee as well as up to \$250 in support



costs for each ap- proved position

• Application Deadline: January 15th (Tentative)

b) Youth United Grant (United Way)

This is a grant of up to \$1000 awarded to youth-led projects that contribute to positive social change in Winnipeg

Criteria:

- At least one of the group members must present the proposal at one of the group presentation evenings, *inquire about age limits when applying
- Grant Amount: Maximum \$1000
- Application Deadline: November 3rd for project presentations on November 16th, January 19th for project presentations on January 31st, and March 23rd for project presentations on April 4th

d) The Youth Gang Prevention Fund (YGPF):

Specifically helps youth with a demonstrated history of serious violence and/or who are clearly at risk of joining gangs and/or are already in gangs. Applications are due October 6th 2021 Recipient could receive for a fiscal year is \$1,500,000 and the amount cannot exceed a maximum amount of \$7,500,000 over a period of five years

- Must be a registered charity and the program must have a clear outcome for increasing physical activity for children with a disability
- New or replacement playground development, breakfast/snack/lunch programs, and organizations that financially support children to participate in a program run by another organization are ineligible
- Equipment can be included in the grant only if it is utilized in a specific program Grant Amount: Maximum \$10 000
- Application Deadline: Early every year (currently determining a deadline) It

I) University of Manitoba Faculty of Social Work

• The setting is be able to provide a sufficient range, quality, and level of experience to enable the student to achieve the faculty's objectives for field instruction, or to work collaboratively with the faculty in exploring ways in which these can be achieved.; The setting should ideally be able to provide educationally-sound placements for at least two social work students, thereby fostering peer learning; There is sufficient time allocated to the staff assigned as agency resource persons to function as field instructors (agency-based instruction) • Grant Amount: N/A

Funding opportunities for women related programs

a) Women and Gender Equality Canada

Women and Gender Equality Canada works to advance equality with respect to sex, sexual orientation, and gender identity or expression through the inclusion of people of all genders, including women, in Canada's economic, social, and political life. Funding opportunities are available through the women's program, the gender-based violence program, and the Equality for Sex, Sexual Orientation, Gender Identity and Expression Program.

Criteria

- Funding is not provided for ongoing activities, such as an organization's operations and administration.
- Also, as available funds are limited, not all qualified applicants may receive funding.

Section Two - Tips for a successful funding application

This section provides tips on how to search for funding and develop a proposal satisfactory to a funder. It is one thing to have general information about funding, but then again, another thing, to



find the right match to your project and or come up with expected funding proposal. This section offers few tips on how to do that.

Right match

Before searching for funding on your own – ask your other members of your community if they know of an appropriate funder that could match the project you are developing. To find funders that best match the type of project you are seeking resources for, consider the following:

• Understand funders priorities & figure out if your project theme matches their interests • Look at the funders website to see what they have funded before. Things like size of grant, type of

project, geography, target group – is it a good fit?

• Different funders require different approaches and styles of proposals

 \circ Foundations and smaller funds like touchy feely, stories, photos, anecdotal \circ Federal government want stats, data, evidence based, quantitative, measurable \circ Corporate funders often like a mix of both!

What to do and/or look for after you find the right funder(s)?

a) Look at the deadlines and create a backwards timeline.

These are few things you need to keep in mind or consider doing:

- Continuous intake vs deadlines
- You should make sure that your final draft is reviewed by another community member at least 2 weeks before the submission deadline in case any changes need to be made
- Sometimes granters will offer to review your proposal and give feedback if you send a draft well before the deadline if this is an option, try to take advantage of it
- Give yourself time between when you want to start your project and the application deadline in or- der to give funders enough time to review your application and decide about your funding. This can often take several months. (Most funders don't provide grants for projects that have been completed)

b) Learn more about the funder's application process:

• Letter of Intent – some organizations have a two-step application process • Application form – most organizations have an application form

c) If you are the main contact, build a relationship with your funder.

- RELATIONSHIPS (a phone call to a funder is very important)
- Call the funder Ask to speak to a Grants Officer and mention the specific grant you would like to

apply for. Tell them who you are, talk about your organization and its good work.

- Follow up with an email, including some info about your org.
- Invite them for a visit or set up an initial meeting

d) Importance of networking or reaching out to partners, friends and or funders!

- You need to have established relationships with people as often the funding is not available/ accessible to orgs that don't have the relationships.
- Examples of the importance of funder relations

• A Foundation calling to say there was a private donor and they thought of our org • Manitoba Local Government dept – having a fund focused on Urban Renewal with no application process – just had to call around and find out about this

- City Councillors, MLA's have a pot of Discretionary Funds that they can use on projects they believe in if you have a relationship, can tap into these funds for events, trainings, or pilot projects
 - Slippage at the end of the year (Dec/Jan) governments often have unused spending and will sometimes put a call out to organizations about small projects or capital needs
- Handover of trust if funders see you working well with established orgs, it will give you credibility
- Bigger agencies can help you ie: SNA lending IRCOM their van for youth sports programs, B&G Club giving IRCOM their policies
- Collaboration is often needed to access some grants

Tips on Budget making

- When creating a budget make sure you add 10-15% for administration. These funds can cover:
- A staff person, an accountant, space rental, office supplies, communication, insurance, and other key overhead costs

• If you are trying to find funds for a core staff, it can be a challenge. One way to do it is by pulling admin lines together to create enough funding for a staff person.

• For example – if you get \$200,000 in program grants (say 4 x \$50K) and you ask for 15% admin on each of these grants and find a free space to work from, you could have \$30K in admin to hire

a staff person

• Some project grants (like Green Team for example) will not let you ask for any admin • If you are not allowed to charge administration, but still have costs to cover – you should add some

lines into your budget that allow you to get some flexible funds. For example: • Communications, supervisory time, supplies, training, promotions, marketing, delivery assistance etc.

- Some government funds will not pay for an administrative assistant, but they may pay for a project assistant who could do similar work.
- Mandatory Employment Related Costs (MERC)
- If you do have staff as part of your budget don't forget to add a line for MERC's
- Mandatory Employment Related Costs Canadian Pension Plan (CPP), Employment Insurance (EI) this should be around 12.5%, if you have benefits to cover add another 4-5%

Things to do before summiting an application

- invite to event
- Relationships phone calls, tours,
- Matching priorities the right fit
- Strong, clear, error free Cover letters
- Letters of support (you draft it, your partner edits it and puts it on letter head) •
- A nice website (especially for out-of-town funders). If you have one
- Establish your credibility track record, right people on your board etc.
- Spend more time revising than you spend writing have a colleague edit, then re-edit... •
- A proposal isn't just informing, it's selling! Honesty & Spin!
- Start with your funder's needs
- Focus on outcome, not process
